
Why use Colourful Semantics?

Colourful Semantics helps children to:

- Develop a wider vocabulary
- Make sentences longer
- Develop use of nouns, verbs, prepositions and adjectives
- Improve story telling skills

How to use Colourful Semantics

There are 4 key colour coded stages to 'show' the structure of a sentence:



Colourful Semantics is first used as an oral activity but it can be transferred to written sentences and written language comprehension. The activity can be carried out individually or in small groups.


