

## Footprints in Time (Autumn Term)





Explain the changes that happened from the Stone Age to the Bronze Age. What made them different? Use conjunctions to help you give reasons.
What would a Stone Age person need to know about our lives? What things would you need to explain to them?	Cave paintings were an important way for people of the Stone Age period to record stories. We know a lot about their lives from these paintings. Tell a story by creating your own cave painting using natural materials.	Overleaf is a picture of tools that were discovered in a ship wreck. These were from the Bronze Age. What do you think they were used for?	Write a description about a Celtic hill fort. You can use the picture on the back to help you. Use expanded noun phrases to describe in detail.	Imagine that you live in a round house.  Describe what a day in your life would have been like. Use paragraphs to split up the day into different sections depending on the time of day.




Example of a Stone Age cave painting:
